## Lesson 6: The friendship of Jobling and Armstrong

| With the whole class discuss/ brainstorm words and phrases you <br> associate with friendship. W rite up the words on a large sheet of cartridge <br> paper and display for reference. |  |
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| Students stand in a space in pairs. They create a symbol to represent <br> friendship, eg a handshake. The students view each others' work. Each pair <br> explains their work. <br> In groups the students create a symbol of friendship. The students view <br> each others' work. | In the same group as the last exercise, students select an extract from <br> the life of Armstrong and Jobling prior to the attack on Fairles. It <br> might be a time when a group of miners are on their way to work, in a pub, <br> poaching, or discussing strike action. The brief extract should last between <br> $30-60$ seconds. It should end in a freeze that clearly indicates the friendship of <br> Armstrong and Jobling. The work is presented for other members of the class to <br> see. | What could show the <br> friendship? A <br> handshake? A look? <br> Arms over each <br> other's shoulders? |

Drama skills/ techniques: Symbolism, abstract form, prepare and share pair and group improvisations.

Personal/ social skill: C oncentration

The company you work for is P C Ltd. The P C is short for Pleasure C aravans. The director is $\mathrm{Mr} / \mathrm{M} \mathrm{s} \mathrm{K}$ ennita. Initially, your job is to meet with the clients and make them feel at ease. W rite their name on the draw ticket, offer them drinks, ask them if they had a good journey, etc.

Begin talking about the special prize of the holiday. Someone will win this in the draw that will take place soon. As promised everyone has won a prize, it is the television. The mystery prize is one thousand pounds. (It is a voucher that can be used as a discount on one of the caravans but don't mention that.) Talk about holidays in England and their advantages particularly at the place where Pleasure C aravans are sited. (D on't mention the caravans.)

After M r/M s Kennita has spoken to the clients, you will try to get the clients to sign the contract. Any signature means you get $£ 400$. ( N ot bad for an hours work!) Good luck!

## R ole-play as Mr/M s Kennita (teacher in role)

Greet all the clients. Shake their hands.
R emind them that they have all won a prize. Their prize is a portable television. H owever, there are still other prizes to be won.

Explain to them that P C stands for Pleasure C aravans. Your company has a large site at the nearest seaside or suitable country resort. The caravans are a marvellous investment. O nce you own one, you can take as many holidays as you want and when you are not using it you can rent it out.

Very soon you would have made enough money to cover any initial cost. Tell the clients you will show them a video of the site later but your immediate task is to organise the prize draw. Draw two sets of tickets. O ne person will win the holiday, the other the $£ 1000$ voucher. Both prizes can be collected only if the winner signs a contract to buy a caravan. The main aim is to sell all the clients a caravan at $£ 12,000$ each, even if it means offering everyone a $£ 1000$ voucher and a free holiday.

See if you can get those signatures. You have a good sales team helping you.
